

## Notes from the Chair

Welcome to the Parish Council's December newsletter.

I can't quite believe that this is the last newsletter of the year and that 2022 is nearly over. It's certainly been a year of change, with both highs and lows, celebration, and sadness.

Personally, I always enjoy this time of year and the build-up to Christmas. This year's annual carol concert, which the Parish Council are once again pleased to support, will be held at the Pavilion, rather than at Vicarage Fields, on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> December at 5pm. Mulled wine, hot chocolate, and mince pies will be available. The Parish Council have purchased additional lights for the village Christmas tree on Vicarage Fields and we hope that you will take time to go and see them.

At the November Parish Council meeting, we discussed and agreed our budget and precept for the next financial year. As I'm sure you can imagine some hard decisions about priorities were needed, but this year has been particularly difficult due to the spike in inflation and electricity prices. However, we continue to make our decisions based on the themes identified during the various village engagement exercises undertaken during the last few years i.e., improve our built and natural environment, help reduce climate change, improve biodiversity, and reduce speeding.

The Parish Council also reviewed our maintenance contract at the same meeting, having now had our new contractor in position for a full mowing season. This tied in with our continued review of the action plans which underpin the Council's Green Spaces strategy. As a result, several small tweaks will be made to the maintenance contract for next year.

On behalf of Hemingford Grey Parish Council, I would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



# Parish Council Updates

### 20mph zone extended

We've previously confirmed that Parish Council was successful in its Local Highways Initiative (LHI) bid to implement a 20mph zone within the centre of the village. After further consideration, the Parish Council approached the County Council and asked them to extend this zone to the whole village and have agreed to cover the additional costs that this will entail. The County are currently consulting on this scheme, and we hope that it will be implemented in early 2023.

#### Grants available for local organisations

The Parish Council has a limited amount of money available to award grants to local groups, charities or organisations for "purposes, which may bring a direct benefit to the area or any part of it for some or all the inhabitants". To be considered for an award, please complete the application from available from the Parish Clerk.

Grants awards are made at the Council's March and October meetings. Any payments made are subject to the normal budgetary constraints and only one grant is available to an organisation in any financial year.

#### Food Bank Collection - Thank You

Community support for foodbanks is vital, particularly in these tough times, so a massive thank you to residents for your generosity in donating to October's Community Foodbank appeal.



We're told by Godmanchester Food bank that the 615kg of food donated is equivalent to sufficient food to provide around 21 family parcels (2 Adults and 3 Children) or 50 parcels for a single person. A parcel contains enough food to provide 3 meals a day for 3 days.

The Parish Council would like to give a special thank you to the 20 or so volunteers who helped us organise and collect the food donations.

### Our community supporting local birds this winter



Back in November the Wild Lives Collective project, an initiative funded by the Parish Council to support residents in engaging with our local wildlife, rounded off the year with activities to support our village's bird

population.

The 1st Hemingford Scouts joined Dr. Jade Gunnell, for the second time this year, to build bird boxes for blue tits, coal tits, great tits and house sparrows. Made from recycled and reclaimed materials, 13 boxes were painstakingly assembled by the Scouts and then installed around Daintree Green and Vicarage Fields, with the intention of not only supporting breeding birds next year, but also providing safe shelter during the winter.





This was followed by two bird feeder making activities, one at the Yes Development and one at Vicarage Fields (the second yet to take place, at the time of writing). The first event, at the children's playground on the Yes Development, saw 11 households come together to make 40 decorative bird feeders from natural materials, such as local apples, sunflower seeds and mealworms. The feeders were distributed across the playground, but also across residents' gardens, where households were encouraged to try to identify the

different species that visit their feeders.

The Parish Council would like to thank Fieldfare / Dr Jade Gunnell for the excellent sessions that have been run this year. We hope to fund a similar project next year, but in the meantime you can:

#### **Planning committee matters**

The Parish Council has no direct planning powers but is consulted by, and can make representations to, Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC). It is HDC's responsibility to inform neighbours of planning applications. Residents are urged to make their own comments on the HDC website. Councillors will usually call on the applicant and relevant neighbours to explain how the council considers applications and how residents can make their views known to the parish council and to HDC. The next Planning Committee meeting will be at 7pm on Monday January 9th in the Reading Room, High Street.

#### Hemingfords Action Group update by Iain Muspratt, Chair


**Astro Turf Site:** There is no evidence this site is owned by MGL. We continue to press the Environment Agency and CCC to require closure of the site as no permit has been issued.
