## **Hemingford Grey school report**

The school has a really strong relationship with its pupils' parents and carers. This has helped it reach out to and build ties with our local community.

The gardening society gives huge support in turning the grounds into inspiring and open spaces in which to learn. Lessons can focus on sustainability and farming, giving children a good understanding of which crops grow best, when to sow them and when to harvest them. Thanks, as ever, go to the gardening society for their continued support.

The school took part in Hemingford Grey's Open Gardens weekend for the first time. It received wonderful feedback from parents and carers, as well as from members of the public, for the grounds, the choir and the quality of artwork. It was a great opportunity to show the achievements of our young people to the village.

## **Hemingford Grey Neighbourhood Plan**

The new Parish Council will make a recommendation on whether to undertake a Neighbourhood Plan, having consulted neighbouring parishes on the processes involved. It will mean reaching out to volunteers with a wide range of skills in the village to help in shaping this if it decides to go ahead. These would include project management, market research, time to deliver leaflets, photography, planning knowledge, building expertise, flood or utilities experience — in fact, any local knowledge will help give structure to the future of Hemingford Grey.

Some items for discussion could be building a village hall, a new play area, proper parking for visitors, sheltered housing, sheds for men, low-cost housing, a new cemetery (we need one), a health centre and so on. Other aspects of a Neighbourhood Plan could be creating a list of village assets in perpetuity. This will give structure for Hemingford Grey well into the 2030s.

## **Transport for the Hemingfords: Parish Council task group report**

Anne Meredith has been working to address Hemingford's looming public transport problems. Other group members include councillors Riva Elliott, Leanne Elmstrom, Doug Dew and Chris Nicol (Hemingford Abbots Parish Council), as well as David Stewart and Alistair Savage.

The task group was established by the Parish Council at its meeting in September 2017 in response to the withdrawal of bus services through Hemingford Grey and Hemingford Abbots by Whippet, and the subsequent introduction of a Monday and Friday service by Dews. Residents living close to London Road are also served by the Busway C and 1A.

The issues that the task group will address include:

- Monitoring the usage and standard of the Mon/Fri service provided by Dews
- Finding out what else villagers need and want
- Working with St Ives Town Council and other relevant parish councils to co-ordinate the transport needs of our village, Godmanchester, Hilton and Fenstanton
- Reporting findings and actions at regular intervals
- Investigating funding
- We estimate £300,000 is needed to take this action forward either through grants to a Community Interest Company (CIC) or through fund-raising.

### **Existing community transport schemes — St Ives Community Car Scheme**

This scheme, operated by the volunteer bureau in St Ives, provides local drivers who will take residents to essential appointments such as doctors and hospitals. There is also capacity for more social journeys: for example, to travel to meetings in St Ives such as University of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Age. The scheme is looking at connecting people to the buses in St Ives if you want to travel to Huntingdon or Cambridge.

Volunteer drivers are still needed. No experience is necessary, just common sense and a sympathetic attitude. Support and guidance is always available from the friendly office. Please note all applicants will be subject to a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS). This used to be known as a Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) check. Satisfactory references will be required.

**Morrison's** is still looking to negotiate a bus scheme, most probably through a CIC.

### **No buses from March 2019**

County Councillor Ian Bates clearly stated at the Annual Parish Council meeting on 21 May there was no legal obligation for bus routes to be subsidised and that there would be no money available to subsidise bus routes after March 2019, either from the County Council or the combined authority.

To resolve interim funding issues the task group is recommending an annual grant to the St Ives Office of the Huntingdonshire Volunteer Bureau for the next four years. It will also promote the Community Car Scheme and HACT within the two parishes. And it is contacting transport providers to discuss the provision of a Monday and Friday service from the two parishes into St Ives.

If you want a permit to walk around the Marsh Lane fishing lake, you need to contact the London Anglers' Association (LAA) for permission. The £6 fee applies to each village household wishing to use the walk. It does not cover a fishing licence fee.

## Village Market celebrates its first anniversary

A display by the Raptor Foundation with various owls and birds of prey marked the first anniversary in June. ## Update on Mick George Ltd planning proposals

Iain Muspratt, treasurer of the SayNo2MickGeorge committee, updates the Parish Council planning committee every month about developments with Mick George Ltd's (MGL) proposed planning application for a waste management site on the Hemingfords' Golf Course site. It is currently a greenfields leisure and recreational facility.

## Change of use — how you can influence decisions

Every resident should have received a newsletter describing how to object to the County Council if it adds this former golf site in its waste and minerals plan for Cambridgeshire. This is just the first of three consultations on the waste and minerals plan for recommended sites. The golf site has so far not appeared on a list.

Objections raised:

- \* Location — Greenfield site near historic villages with numerous listed buildings
  - \* Existing capacity in the area at Ellington and St Ives — Room to expand at Ellington without any local impact
  - \* Traffic concerns — 400 HCV movements per day on a poor access road, a long way from the new A14 trunk road
  - \* Up to 100 jobs at local businesses would be under threat if development goes ahead

The committee is also looking for more ambassadors, experts and those with local knowledge to help with the campaign.

## Update on Goldies Club and the use of new technologies

The club is taking shape with the registration of a Community Interest Company (CIC, not for profit), the reservation of a website name (URL) and the formation of a bank account with the Co-op Bank, allowing us to bank through the village Post Office. Goldies is a social enterprise focussed on bringing the local community together to help those needing extra support from time to time. It will also bring economic efficiencies to how local authorities manage care in the community.

The inaugural meeting will allocate tasks to the committee: Riva Elliott, Edward Byam-Cook, Christine Batter and Leanne Elmstrom. There are several strands to develop in creating the village hub.

- Providing a conduit for the Parish Council's Transport Task Group to raise funds for a permanent village minibus
- The adoption of Age UK's Good Neighbour and befriending scheme
- Working with the Campaign to End Loneliness — which helps those who wish to join in more but find it hard
- Adopting artificial intelligence (AI) and wearable technology to improve communications with family, carers, health workers and friends
- Working with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority's future of transport team
- Liaising with the church to create a team of volunteers to visit and befriend parishioners, as well as provide a place to meet and eat at the Garden Café
- Encouraging inter-generational get-togethers, where learning and insights work in both directions.

## Environment report

The Parish Council's environment group monitors the village's environmental issues. We listen to your observations and take actions across many projects.

These include grounds maintenance for our cemetery and open spaces, looking after the parish-owned street-lights, emptying our litter bins and maintaining all the benches.

We provide allotments and offer them at reasonable fees to those who enjoy gardening. If you would like to rent one, there are still one or two vacant.

The parish carries out a survey of our trees every three years and identifies any work needed for safety or aesthetic reasons. We also keep on top of the County and District

Councils' responsibilities for highways maintenance, grass-cutting and the other litter bins as well as keeping our drainage systems in good order in case of heavy rain.

At this time of year, we would like to remind residents that trees and hedges grow very quickly and sometimes obstruct roads, pavements and footpaths. Anyone driving, cycling or walking in the village would appreciate these being kept clear on a regular basis for safety reasons as well as to keep the parish looking good. We appreciate that some residents may find maintenance beyond their capabilities and we would urge them to seek help from friendly neighbours, or ask us for guidance.

Urgent action is being taken to repair the fence around the Mitchell Close play area and to remove weeds and brambles from the river bank ready for the Regatta. We are also looking to fix the narrow and inadequate footpath along Gore Tree Road from Burlington Way to Manor Road.

## Planning Committee Matters

*The Parish Council has no direct planning powers but is consulted by, and can make recommendations to, Huntingdonshire District Council. It is HDC's responsibility to inform neighbours of planning applications, but the Parish Council normally sends councillors to look at the property concerned and call on neighbours to ensure they are aware.
