New Parish Council Website

The Parish Council will have a new website from December 7th. Our new site is provided by a company that specialises in delivering websites specifically for Parish and Town Councils.

Since the Parish Council website was relaunched in 2015 we have made quite a few updates and amendments to it to try and make it more informative and easy to use.

Ownership of gov.uk websites is limited to UK government and local government bodies. A gov.uk domain name can provide assurance that the website (or email address) is official and is publicly accountable.

By moving to this address it also means that everything related to the Parish Council website is now managed by one company which makes it easier to manage and provides financial savings to the previous contracts in place.

The new site will have a Parish Council calendar that will have details of all the meetings as well as the agendas and minutes attached to those meetings.

Other features include an A to Z of services that links to Parish Council, District Council and County Council services (see below).

This feature means that it should become easier for users to get the information and contact details of the appropriate provider.

We hope that the website will become a central hub for local residents, visitors to Hemingford Grey and those looking to move into the area.

Hemingford Grey Primary School and Hemingford Gardeners' Society

As we move into winter, the children have been working alongside the Hemingford Gardeners' Society to prepare for the colder days ahead. The children have been finishing the harvest in the allotments and planting onions ready for next year. Using the equipment that we kindly received from the society, the children have dead-headed the perennials and moved plants into their final positions within our Memorial Garden colour wheel.

The Wild Area has received a trim from a tree surgeon and the children have used the resulting wood chips to mulch the plants around school. Key Stage 1 have added hanging baskets to their decking area filled with winter pansies and spring bulbs, while Key Stage 2 have filled the Quiet Area pots with winter viola, rosemary and even more spring bulbs.

Finally, as part of the Year 5 and 6 Tudor theme, the children took part in a Tudor day during which they used the cut grass from the Wild Flower Mound to create hay for the chickens.

We will be holding our Hand Made at Hemingford Christmas Fayre on Friday 1st December. At this event we will be making and selling decorated pinecones, Christmas wreaths and lavender bags using our own lavender, as well as selling Sweet Peas grown by the children and many edible delights.

As a school, we continue to be very grateful for the support of the Hemingford Grey Gardeners' Society.

Fireworks in Hemingford

It was back in the 1950s when residents of Hemingford Grey gathered up garden rubbish, potato tops and straw from Docksey's farm and organised a bonfire on November 5th.

The next year it was held at Hemingford Grey School with the villagers bringing their rubbish to burn and because of its success it was decided that it should become an annual event!

Hemingford Road was closed so a procession of people carrying candles in jam jars could walk to the site. At the head of the procession was a dressed guy – a villager being pushed on a funeral cart, but he was not burned at the stake!

And so the event grew. It moved to Long Lane which is now the Pinders Green development, then it went to the Vineyard near the Hemingford Pavilion. The event made money and when it was moved to Chapman's Field it started to fundraise for local causes.

The village shop was joined by other shops and pubs in the area to sell tickets. There was a programme. The Caravan Club held a rally at the site. The list of donation recipients grew.

After a short spell at Crystal Lakes Fenstanton it moved to the Park Field off London Road over 25 years ago where, on November 4, 2017, it was held for the last time.

It is not intended that this is the end of the event. Although four committee members are stepping down (average age 79 and one who has been with the event since inception), we have had new volunteers come forward with energy and ideas to take the event to new heights. They will be looking for a new location, so "watch this space"!

Over the years the event has been responsibly managed by a small group of village volunteers and the local fireworks organisation. It has had to be run more formally. Observing health and safety requirements, risk assessments and, as the crowd numbers increased, insurance costs grew. In recent years the event grew to be one of the largest in the area. It was estimated we were attracting over 4000 people from all over the area and beyond! On the day, and day after, volunteer numbers grow to ensure the evening runs smoothly and the field is left ready for the sheep to graze.

It focused on its mission, "Fun for All the Family", listened to its audience and started earlier in the evening than other events.

We had a fun fair for kiddies and lit the bonfire early to create the atmosphere of warmth to lead up to the amazing firework display that usually went on for twenty minutes! We enabled persons with disabilities to attend more easily and young carers too. We maintained ticket prices and, more recently, created a website and Facebook page. We became a facilitator for various service groups to raise their own funds and MAGPAS to raise money collecting on the New Bridges. It was an event the villages can be proud of, and we all had so much fun!

Community Car Scheme

Since the loss of the Go Whippet bus service in Hemingford Grey, the Parish Council has been working with Huntingdonshire Volunteer Centre, specifically the St Ives branch of the Community Car Scheme to increase awareness of alternatives to buses.

The Scheme works by matching passengers with volunteer drivers who use their own cars to take them to hospital appointments, shopping or even to visit friends and relations.

Passengers pay the drivers 40p a mile based on the driver's mileage, to cover the driver's expenses, plus a £1 booking fee which the driver passes on to the office to cover administration costs.

With the help of the Hemingford Grey Parish Council, we have recruited four new drivers which has increased our capacity for Hemingford residents.

The scheme is primarily there for essential journeys, however, with the new drivers there is some capacity for more social journeys, for example to meetings in St Ives such as U3A. We will also look at connecting people to the buses in St Ives if you wanted to go to Huntingdon or Cambridge.

The more drivers we have the more we can help your community.

Could you become a volunteer driver and help your neighbours in this way?

No experience is necessary, just common sense and a sympathetic attitude. Support and guidance is always available from our friendly office. Please note that all applicants will be subject to a DBS check and satisfactory references will be required.

Update on the proposed Mick George Ltd Waste Management site for the former Hemingford Golf Course provided by the SayNo2MickGeorge committee

Iain Muspratt, treasurer of the SayNo2MickGeorge committee updated the Parish Council Planning Committee on Monday 13 November on the latest developments of the Mick George Ltd (MGL) proposed planning application. MGL acquired the former Hemingford Abbots Golf course for a waste management site in 2016. To date, no planning application has been submitted, however the land has not been allocated as a suitable plot for waste management by Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) — yet. CCC are conducting a formal review of the current Waste and Minerals Plan and it is essential that the site remains excluded. Parish Councils, the SayNo2MickGeorge committee AND residents will be able to make representations in the new year during the first stage of consultation. The Parish Council will keep residents informed.

The SayNo2MickGeorge committee is monitoring MGL business behaviours and claims, and has noted the following statistics with regards to the Hemingfords:

Size of main building - The MGL building alone (situated on a hill overlooking the village) could cover 411,942 sq ft — Tesco's at Bar Hill covers 60,000 sq ft — making it nearly 7 times the size of this superstore. The height could be nearly 50ft or 15 meters, meaning it would be clearly visible from the villages (especially as the site will be lit through the night).

Traffic - There could be upwards of 1000 lorry movements per day on this site over a 12-hour day — 1.38 lorries per minute. At busy times there could be several per minute. It is possible that 200 lorries could also be parked at this site. MGL has also suggested a lorry workshop could operate from there. Other such sites operate until 03.00 when busy. Each MGL lorry has to be checked at a workshop once a month.

Noise, Dust and Pollution - The SayNo2MickGeorge committee held a ramble around the proposed site on Sunday 19 November. It was pointed out that the prevailing wind means that Hemingford Grey could be affected by noise, dust and pollution.

Going forward

1 Iain Muspratt said a member of the SayNo2MickGeorge committee will attend every Parish Council meeting to keep residents informed. The Council was informed of the possibility that 100 jobs could be put at risk alongside this site, and some businesses may have to close due to noise, dust and traffic congestion. And an elderly resident, who kindly gave us access to her land for the ramble, would have a blighted existence next door to the site.

2 Muspratt mentioned fund-raising is progressing well with over £33,000 now raised. The

SayNo2MickGeorge committee has a target of £50,000 to ensure they have enough in the kitty to respond to any MGL planning application when submitted.

3 The next stage for the villages is to monitor and fully respond to any proposal in the new CCC Waste and Minerals plan should it suddenly include the golf course. Currently the golf course is designated for leisure and recreation usage, which is beneficial to all in the surrounding area.

Hemingford Grey Neighbourhood Watch

Recent reports have shown that the burglary rate in Hemingford Grey has fallen this year. The police think that this is due in part to residents' vigilance and reporting. The Hemingford Grey NHW Facebook page continues to be a very useful tool for villagers to alert each other of suspicious behaviour while still reporting it to police on 101.

Unfortunately since the resignation of our Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator Esther Harrod, no one has stepped forward to take up the role, but we are happy to report that there is now a new administrator in place who is managing the Facebook page. We would like to thank Esther for all her hard work with regards to the Neighbourhood Watch scheme in the village.

If you are not a member of Hemingford Grey NHW scheme, please go to the website listed below or call the number at the bottom of the page.

Follow the instructions and you will be able to find your own street scheme by typing in Hemingford Grey followed by the road that you live in. You will receive weekly local police alerts if you are not already a member of E-Cops.

If you see suspicious activity please report it on 101 and ask to be put through to the burglary department.

Planning Committee Matters

The Parish Council has no direct planning powers but is consulted by, and can make recommendations to, Huntingdonshire District Council. It is HDC's responsibility to inform neighbours of planning applications, but the Parish Council normally sends councillors to look at the property concerned and call on neighbours to ensure they are aware. Residents are urged to make their own comments on the HDC web site.

HDC Local Plan

Your planning committee discussed the recent sites in and around the parish being put forward by land owners and developers. HDC's immediate response is that sites for a total of 281 dwellings within the parish are 'potentially suitable'. Government pressure for house building is increasing and it seems that Huntingdonshire's Local Plan (LP) will need to provide for even more dwellings in the next 10 years. We have asked HDC for clarification on the draft LP and the latest Strategic Flood Risk Assessment (SFRA). Both of these imply that all of the sites put forward in and around HG would be unsuitable.

Our response points out that we no longer have any significant public transport; that all of the sites as shown by the SFRA are at risk of flooding and that our village is a 'small settlement' with very limited facilities which all suffer from a lack of parking. Our comments in full are on the web (HGPC planning committee minutes) and (HDC's HELAA consultation).

Hemingford Grey Neighbourhood Plan?

How do you see the village in 10 or 20 years? Can we rely on HDC and individual land owners to get it right or do we want to have some democratic control? A Neighbourhood Plan (NP) is subject to a parish referendum and gives a parish more control over planning decisions within its boundaries. HGPC is exploring the potential costs and benefits of promoting such a plan. In November the PC agreed to consult with HDC on the NP process including the necessity for a housing needs survey and how the NP might fit with the emerging Local Plan. What is already quite clear is that the PC cannot produce a Neighbourhood Plan without the help of many other parish residents and organisations. If YOU think that we need such a plan then we hope that YOU will come forward to help. The NP needs a vision of where any development might take place, what community facilities will be needed (e.g. new cemetery, playing fields, etc)

and what specific features of our existing environment should be preserved. However, it will take at least two years; it will take a lot of time and effort; and it will have to be compatible with HDC's Local Plan. The NP would concentrate entirely on planning aspects and would be integrated with the Local Plan and have equal weight in any planning decisions. Please come and talk to us at the village markets on 9th December or 13th January.

Offer of wood chippings and wood to local communities

Huntingdonshire District Council's tree maintenance department is developing a recycling venture with the view to donating their bio products created from the tree maintenance work they carry out around the district.

The aim is to donate wood chippings and wood to local communities to contribute and support green projects and to promote the use of recyclable material.

They can offer wood chippings for allotments, landscape programmes, shrub bedding, tree planting and hedge planting, equine use, mulching, trim trails and tracks.

They can offer wood in an unprocessed form which can be used for other projects.

Currently they can only offer full loads or half loads of woodchip or wood, a full load of woodchip is estimated to be 2t (2000kg) and a full load of unprocessed wood is currently not calculable due to different wood weights and sizes.

In return they ask for an accessible site for their vehicle to enter to drop off any wood chippings or wood with your permission.
