## Notes from the Chairman

Can I begin by expressing a huge thank you to all who have served on the Parish Council for the past four years while I have been Chairman. During this time I hope we have become a more inclusive and approachable body.

Elections are being held on 3 May this year to elect members of the Parish Council. Can I put a plea out to encourage you to come forward to serve this fantastic and vibrant community?

I know my colleagues have achieved good progress. We have upgraded our street lights to be brighter and more energy-efficient, and worked on road flooding issues — particularly in Apple Orchard. We have also improved road safety on Hemingford Road and around Victoria Terrace. And we were instrumental in getting the new pedestrian crossing outside the school.

We have become a much more open and approachable Council and have attended events, such as the monthly Village Market, so that people can come and talk about village issues with us.

We are working hard to include residents of the Yes Development in village concerns. We are pleased we now have representatives on our Parish Council.

I have enjoyed my four years as chairman, and wish the next chair every success. I offer my full support to whoever takes up the position.

## Hemingford Grey school report

The school continues to thrive and the children are developing into self-motivated and determined learners. We were subject to a two-day review in December and January and the consultant undertaking the review was very impressed.

*"You place great importance on the emotional well-being of your pupils. This is reflected in many aspects of life in your school. Classroom displays promote emotional literacy; pupils understand the school's core values. It is clear from visiting your classrooms and speaking with your pupils that your expectations for high standards of behaviour and welfare benefit your pupils greatly. Pupils are respectful and polite towards each other and with the adults in school. They are able to explain clearly what they are learning and the ways in which their teachers help them to improve. Pupils take pride in their work because of the expectations of their teachers."*

We have been delighted to welcome parents into school to learn science alongside their children, and to attend workshops on a range of subjects. We continue to work with the Hemingford Gardening Society and are so appreciative of their support.

The children in Year 5 and 6 have been working outdoors to construct a new bug hotel next to our wildflower mound, in preparation for the emergence of insects when spring arrives. Old pallets have been recycled to provide a sustainable habitat for small creatures. We have also planted several fruit trees to expand the produce we are able to harvest.

We hope that those of you who do not have children at the school will visit over Open Gardens weekend, when the school grounds will be open from 10am-noon on 16 June.

## Hemingford Grey Neighbourhood Plan

There are no plans for housing in the District Council's Local Plan (so far) for the village, but we feel it's best to be ready should a change of government policy happen.

Our village is classified as a 'smaller settlement' with no allocation (at the moment) for any land within our parish boundary to be developed in this Local Plan. Despite having Environment Agency flood defences installed in 2006, we are still considered to be at significant risk of flooding.

However, government policy could change:

- if flood modelling is revised
- if the District Council runs out of suitable development land elsewhere.

## **Hemingford Grey: Have your say!**

This is your chance to help in deciding the future of Hemingford Grey.

The Parish Council has decided that we should undertake our own Neighbourhood Plan, and wants to involve everyone in the village to help in shaping this. There is a wide range of skills needed. For instance: project management, market research, time to deliver leaflets, photography, planning knowledge, building expertise, flood or utilities experience — in fact any local knowledge you may have that will give structure to how we see our future. Together we can write our own plans to enhance our village.

We know what our community wants and needs better than any outside agency. So we should be part of the guidance for planning our own development.

We could propose having our own village hall, a new play area, proper parking for visitors, sheltered housing, sheds for men, low-cost housing, a new cemetery (we need one), a health centre and so on.

Our village is historic. We need to ensure that we preserve and protect our village assets. It's a big task, and we need your help. Our village is full of talented people. Maybe you can spare a couple of hours to lend a hand in pulling the vital information together.

You'll play a key role in creating a working document that will last Hemingford Grey well into the 2030s.

The Neighbourhood Plan will probably take at least two years to create and agree. It will demand a great deal of careful thought, and it must be compatible with Huntingdon District Council's own Local Plan. But our version will have equal weight in any planning decisions.

The Parish Council will shortly distribute a questionnaire to every household to find out residents' views and to start the discussion. Please complete this and return it to the village shop or by post to the Parish Clerk (see questionnaire for address) by the end of May. Members of the Council will be at the village markets on 14 April and 12 May, so come along and talk to us about the things that concern you and what you would like from and for your village over the next two decades.

## **Transport for the Hemingfords: Parish Council task group**

The task group (representing the Parish Councils of Hemingford Grey and Hemingford Abbots) has been working on the transport issues facing the two parishes.

We are pleased to see that the Monday and Friday bus service provided by Dews continues to be well used. The Volunteer Bureau in St Ives reports that the Community Car Scheme now has at least six drivers from the Hemingfords and that the majority of lifts provided to our residents are given by village drivers. All requests for transport, given with three days' notice, have been met, as well as most requests given at short notice. So if you would like to know more, phone the Bureau on 01480 301462 (Monday to Thursday 12.30pm-3pm).

Members of the task group attended a meeting organised by St Ives Town Council, where the town council and eight parish councils shared information on the bus situation. It was decided to invite representatives of Cambridgeshire County Council to discuss the transport issues facing St Ives and surrounding villages.

Huntingdon Association for Community Transport (HACT) came to our Parish Council meeting on 12 February and outlined what services it provides for residents in our parishes. Did you know that on the second Wednesday of each month, HACT can take you into Cambridge for the day? Finally, residents have told us that it has proved difficult to access medical services in St Ives because of the lack of buses. We are surveying doctors, dentists and other health providers for more information.

## **Community Car Scheme**

The Parish Council has been working with Huntingdonshire Volunteer Centre, specifically the St Ives branch of the Community Car Scheme, to increase awareness of alternatives to buses since the loss of the Go Whippet service in Hemingford Grey.

The scheme matches passengers with volunteer drivers, who use their own cars to take those in need of the service to hospital appointments, shopping or even to visit friends and relations.

Passengers pay 40p a mile based on the driver's mileage, to cover the driver's expenses, plus a £1 booking fee which the driver passes on to the volunteer centre office to cover administration costs. With the help of the Parish Council, four new drivers have been recruited, which has increased capacity to supply transport for Hemingford residents.

The scheme is primarily there for essential journeys. However, with the new drivers, there is some capacity for more social journeys: for example, to travel to meetings in St Ives such as University of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Age. The scheme will also look at connecting people to the buses in St Ives if you want to travel to Huntingdon or Cambridge.

Volunteer drivers are still needed. No experience is necessary; just common sense and a sympathetic attitude. Support and guidance is always available from the friendly office. Note that all applicants will be subject to a Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS). This used to be known as a Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) check. Satisfactory references will be required.

## **Update on Mick George Ltd planning proposals**

Iain Muspratt, treasurer of the SayNo2MickGeorge committee, updated the Parish Council planning committee on Monday 13 March about the latest developments of the Mick George Ltd (MGL) proposed planning application for the creation of Cambridgeshire's largest waste management site. MGL proposes to use the Hemingford Golf Course site, which is designated as a leisure and recreational facility for this. Obviously we want to keep it designated for this use only. Huntingdon District Council (HDC) and our MP, Jonathan Djanogly, appear to back this.

MGL told Fenstanton Parish Council in early February that the planning application would be submitted by 23 February, it was not.

BUT on 12 March the HDC development committee was asked to approve handing over its role in any such planning application to Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC), as this application was expected imminently. MGL's plan accompanying this proposal shows little change from before, but now includes the neighbouring area used for astro turf and is designated as a waste site. This implies MGL now owns this land too. MGL has renamed the entire development New Farm West rather than Hemingford Golf Course. We are calling for HDC councillors to oppose handing over their planning powers to CCC.

MGL has been taken by surprise with the vehemence of Hemingford opposition to date. The company's delay in submitting a planning application may be explained by the following:

- MGL has spent a lot of time and money appealing a decision made by Lincolnshire County Council (and all other local authorities) to refuse permission to extract limestone from a Grantham quarry, and then use it for landfill. Opposition has been led by an action group over the past three years. The Inspector's decision is expected in April.
- CCC together with Peterborough is about to start work on a new Waste and Minerals Plan. Be in no doubt: MGL will campaign hard to have the Hemingford Golf Course/New West Farm site included because it is not in the current plan.

Our aim is to ensure the site remains excluded. And we need as much help and support as possible to achieve this.

### **A family event**

Hemingfords Action Group is holding a ramble and art competition at Abbots Events, next door to the golf course site on Saturday 16 June. You will get to see how large the site is and how near it is to our homes. Children will take part in a colouring and painting competition, with prizes for everyone, while adults join the ramble.

If adults feel inspired to submit pictures of scenes from our villages or images reflecting our environment, please submit your entries by 9 June, with judging taking place on 16 June. The ramble is followed by a hog roast, with vegetarian option. You're invited to have a free session of putting and using the golf driving range.

### **A history of adding more waste**

Our focus is to prevent any industrialisation of the golf course site. Once MGL gets any permission, however restricted initially, the company has a history of creeping development, introducing more and more processes and wastes as time goes on. We

cannot state strongly enough, that when a planning application is made, the whole community needs to join forces to stop Mick George Ltd from building Cambridgeshire's largest waste recycling plant on our doorstep. Technical assessment requirements for the new Waste and Minerals Plan should be available by 9 April. It is vital that Hemingford Golf Course remains excluded from this new plan. HDC may still be involved in this decision and we need to know that we have the support of candidates in the May 2018 District Council elections.

## **Offer of wood chippings and wood to local communities**

Huntingdonshire District Council's tree maintenance department is developing a recycling venture with the view to donating its bio products created from the tree maintenance work it carries out around the district.

The aim is to donate wood chippings and wood to local communities to contribute and support green projects and to promote the use of recyclable material.

It can offer wood chippings for allotments, landscape programmes, shrub bedding, tree planting and hedge planting, equine use, mulching, trim trails and tracks.

It can offer wood in an unprocessed form which can be used for other projects.

Currently it can only offer full loads or half loads of woodchip or wood. A full load of woodchip is estimated to be 2t (2000kg) and a full load of unprocessed wood is currently not calculable due to different wood weights and sizes.

In return it asks for an accessible site for its vehicle to enter to drop off any wood chippings or wood with your permission.
